#### **SUMMARY**

The Oakland Parks, Recreation & Youth Development received a request from The Hemophilia Foundation of Northern California (HFNC), a non-profit organization, that serves families with life-threatening blood disorders, factor deficiencies, and rare clotting conditions. HFNC is requesting to collect onsite donations, registration fees and sales of raffle tickets at their 5th Annual Hemophilia Walk to be held at Lakeside Park (Pergola) on Saturday, May 16, 2020 (setup) and Sunday, May 17, 2020. Approval from the Parks and Recreation Advisory Commission is required per O.M.C. section 12.64.080.

#### FISCAL IMPACT

The Hemophilia Foundation of Northern California is paying all rental fees associated with the event estimated at \$2813.00.

#### PROJECT / PROGRAM DESCRIPTION

HFNC is proud to be one of thirty-two chapters participating in the National Hemophilia Foundation (HFNC) Hemophilia Walk program. It is made possible through the generous support of all their sponsors. In 2008, HFNC created a collaborative fundraising program that would help chapters raise the funds needed to support research and provide programs and direct services to people with bleeding disorders. This fundraiser will be HFNC's largest event dedicated to researching better treatments and cures for bleeding and clotting disorders, and to prevent the complications of these disorders through awareness, education, advocacy and research.

The estimated attendance is 500.

#### BACKGROUND / LEGISLATIVE HISTORY

In 1948, the National Hemophilia Foundation of Northern California began as an effort to raise awareness for a small group of hemophilia patients. Today, they provide advocacy, support, and resources to over 3,000 Northern California families (in 47 counties) with a myriad of inherited and acquired blood related conditions. The Hemophilia Foundation of Northern California (HFNC) mission is to serve the needs of people impacted by bleeding disorders through enhancing quality of

life by providing support, education, outreach, advocacy and research through our affiliated national foundations.

#### **RECOMMENDATION**

Staff recommends that the Parks and Recreation Advisory Commission approve the request from the Hemophilia Foundation of Northern California to collect onsite donations, registration fees and sales of raffle tickets at the 5th Annual Hemophilia Walk to be held at Lakeside Park Pergola on Saturday, May 16, 2020 (Setup) and Sunday, May 17, 2020, 8:00am-1:00pm.

The Hemophilia Foundation of Northern California is a 61 year old non-profit located in Emeryville and serving patients and families in 20 Northern California counties with bleeding disorders. We provide education, support, advocacy and networking opportunities that enhance the quality of life for patients and their families with bleeding disorders.

Unite for Bleeding Disorders Walk is our community's opportunity to raise funds for our programs which rely upon grants and donations to continue. Most fundraising is done pre-event utilizing our Unite for Bleeding Disorders Walk page on the web. Burger Boogaloo is requesting once again the approval of the solicitation of an onsite entrance fee in which proceeds will go to help cover cost of musicians, equipment, marketing staffing, and facility usage and donation fees. In addition, Burger Boogaloo is requesting the approval of sales of merchandise, food concessions and alcoholic beverages. Best Beverage Catering Company will be contracted to facilitate all management and security of alcohol sales. Best Beverage Catering is a reputable company that has managed such events as Outside Lands Music Festival in Golden Gate Park and Treasure Island Music Festival. Burger Boogaloo has also secured designated alcohol zone. Local food concessions will be provided by Oakland merchants.

Approval from the Parks and Recreation Advisory Commission is required per Oakland Municipal Code-O.M.C section 12.64.080.

#### FISCAL IMPACT

Mosswood will provide two staff to help monitor this event for a total fiscal impact of approximately \$1200 and expend 20 hours for the day. Funding for staff time will come from Mosswood self-sustaining fund 1820. Burger Boogaloo will provide lighting, sound, equipment, advertising, staffing, medical care, temporary fencing, and security. Mosswood will generate \$12,690 in rental fees for this event.

Oakland Public Works will provide an additional 30 trash boxes to be placed throughout the park to accommodate for extra trash.

## PROJECT / PROGRAM DESCRIPTION

The mission of Burger Boogaloo is and has been to showcase local musicians and bring together the arts community in Oakland, CA and the surrounding areas. The festival will be held at Mosswood

Park form 12:00pm – 10:00pm on July 11<sup>th</sup> and July 12<sup>th</sup>, 2020 and is supported by Eastbay Express, SF Guardian and many local merchants. The event will be hosted by John Waters, an America film director, screenwriter, author, and actor, for the third year in a row. With the success of last year's event Burger Boogaloo organizers strive to make this an annual event with Oakland Parks, Recreation, and Youth Development and continue to attract local and legendary performers. Set-up for this event will occur on Friday, July 10<sup>th</sup>. Burger Boogaloo obtains security and maintenance crew, medical staff, fencing and portable restrooms. Mosswood Recreation Center staff will be available during set-up time to monitor.

## BACKGROUND / LEGISLATIVE HISTORY

Burger Boogaloo, now in its eighth year at Mosswood Park, was organized by Marc Ribak and Amy Ribak, with the help of Sean Borhman of Burger Records. Burger Records feature a lineup of over 100 fantastic Rock/Pop music acts. Of these acts, about 20-25 will perform on two stages at the 2020 summer event. More details, including a list of performers, can be found on their website at www.Burgerboogaloo.com.

Burger Boogaloo provides an opportunity to showcase local talent not only in the music industry, but in the food industry as well. Last year featured 10 vendors serving a variety of food and drink from burgers and beers to vegan treats and gourmet coffee.

#### **SUMMARY**

The Oak Knoll Mixed Use Community is located on the former Oak Knoll Naval Medical Center Property at 8750 Mountain Boulevard, bounded by Keller Avenue and Mountain Boulevard. The Project consists of a Master Planned community on approximately 191 acres consisting of 918 residences, 72,000 square feet of neighborhood commercial, 14,000 square feet of civic/commercial use. The Project incorporates 78.6 acres of Open Space and Parks, including approximately 6.6 acres of public parks. The four public parks were presented and approved by City Council on November 28, 2017. The associated Final Development Plan for the Master Developer Site Improvements included final schematic design for the parks, which was approved by the City Council on November 28, 2017.

The approved park plans are included in Exhibit A, Final Development Plan: Master Developer Site Improvements. The four parks include:

- Creekside Park. Creekside Park is located along Mountain Boulevard at the entrance to Oak Knoll, between Creekside Parkway and Creekside Loop, and adjacent to Rifle Range Creek. The park is approximately 1.1 acres. It is a passive park with a play lawn, multi-use trail, entrance feature, and benches. The park includes Public Art, which was reviewed by the Oakland Public Arts Advisory Committee in August 2019. (Exhibit A pages L026-L028)
- North Neighborhood Park. North Neighborhood Park is located in the northern part of Oak Knoll, near the Creekside Parkway entrance on Keller Avenue, adjacent to Rifle Range Creek. The park is approximately 3 acres. It is an active park with a play lawn, children's play area, picnic tables, pathway, and park seating. (Exhibit A pages L029-L031)
- Village Pocket Park. Village Pocket Park is centrally located in Oak Knoll, off of Creekside Loop, across from the Club Knoll Community Center. The park is approximately 0.2 acres. It is a passive park with a passive play lawn, formal garden, benches, and a garden pathway. (Exhibit A pages L032-L034)
- Oak Knoll Memorial Park. Oak Knoll Memorial Park is located in the northern portion of the Oak Knoll development near Keller Avenue, but accessed by trail. The park is approximately 2.3 acres. It is a passive park in an existing hillside meadow with benches and a trail. (Exhibit A page L035)

The parks will be dedicated to the City of Oakland and will be maintained by a Community Facilities District (explained below). The approved park plans are included in Exhibit A to this report.

#### **FISCAL IMPACT**

The parks will be dedicated to the City of Oakland and will be maintained by a Community Facilities District. The City of Oakland is currently in the process of forming a Community Facilities District (CFD) which is a public facilities maintenance fund to be administered by the City of Oakland specifically for maintenance of the public facilities in the Oak Knoll Mixed Use Community. The CFD charges a rate to property owners in the service area for specified maintenance. In this way, delivery and maintenance of the four new parks discussed in this report will have no fiscal impacts for the City of Oakland.

### PROJECT / PROGRAM DESCRIPTION

The Oak Knoll Mixed Use Community project includes the provision of four public parks. The location and design of the four parks was previously approved by the City Council. The developer will build the parks and then dedicate the parks to the City of Oakland. As noted above, maintenance of the parks will be paid for and managed by the CFD.

#### BACKGROUND / LEGISLATIVE HISTORY

The following provides the timeline for approval of the Oak Knoll Mixed Use Community, including the approval of the Final Development Plan for Master Developer Site Improvements, which includes the four public parks:

- March 9,2015, the developer submitted an application for environmental review to the Bureau of Planning to develop 935 residential units, over 84 acres of parks and open space and over 72,000 square feet of neighborhood serving commercial space, including an application to rezone the Project site to a new Zoning district, the D-OK Oak Knoll District and Zone Regulations, including new Zoning Districts D-OK-1 through D-OK-7, with accompanying new Zoning Text and Zoning Map changes (Project); and
- March 20, 2015, a Notice of Preparation of a Draft Supplemental Environmental Impact Report ("SEIR") for the Project was published pursuant to the California Environmental Quality ("CEQA"); and
- July 27, 2016, October 26, 2016, December 14, 2016 the Preliminary Development Plan and the Final Development Plan for Master Developer Site Improvements were presented to the Design Review Committee; and
- October 18, 2017 the City Planning Commission, after conducting and closing the public hearing, recommended that the City Council: (a) adopt the required CEQA findings, including certifying the SEIR and rejecting alternatives as infeasible; (b) adopt the Standard Conditions of Approval and Mitigation Monitoring and Reporting Program ("SCAMMRP"); and (c) approve the Project including Rezoning, based in part upon the Findings contained in the October 18, 2017 City Planning Commission Agenda Report and attachments ("City Planning Commission Report"), including The Final Development Plan for Master Developer Site Improvements, which includes the four public parks; and

- November 28, 2017 the City Council approved the D-OK Oak Knoll District Zone Regulations and Zoning Map changes for the Project site.

- July 2019 The Oakland Public Art Advisory Committee received a presentation on the Oak Knoll Public Art Plan (five projects).
- August 7, 2019 The Oakland Public Art Advisory Committee reviewed and approved unanimously the project design proposal by artist Yoshikawa Wright, to be placed on City property in Creekside Park.

Ana was a native Californian, born in Santa Cruz and lived in the Bay Area and Southern California as a child. She attended U.C. Berkeley and earned a Bachelor's degree in History in 2004, and then obtained a Juris Doctor degree from Yale Law School in 2009. Ana spent the first years of her legal career working domestically and abroad in the field of International Arbitration, and later left the big firms to focus on environmental protection.

Ana was hired as a Legal Fellow at the U.C. Berkeley Law School Environmental Law Clinic in the fall of 2016. At the time of Ana's death at age 36, she was working on projects to ensure clean drinking water to all Californians, and to improve the United States' oil spill response. Her legacy lives on in these projects which her family and friends have learned are still moving forward.

In her free time, Ana enjoyed running around Lake Merritt, playing soccer, painting, and writing fiction. In the last six months of Ana's life, she wrote and illustrated a children's book while homebound.

Ana's supervisor and Director of Environmental Law Clinic described Ana as an extraordinary project supervisor -- a mentor to the strongest students as well as a tireless helper to struggling students. She is missed by family and friends.

Nancy Clapsadle was born on March 25, 1934 in Kenmore, New York. She graduated from Niagara University in 1953, and became a nurse. Ms. Clapsadle traveled with the Peace Corps for several years in the 1950's and 60's in Malaysia and Borneo, using her skills as a healer to help in impoverished areas. Her passion for charity and volunteer work continued throughout her life and she made frequent donations to the Red Cross and the World Health Organization, among others.

Ms. Clapsadle earned her master's degree in public health at Johns Hopkins University. She moved to California in 1970 and purchased a home in the Temescal neighborhood of Oakland, where she went on to work at Kaiser Hospital for over thirty years. She loved the city and made many friends in the community. Although she was a world traveler, Ms. Clapsadle was woven into the rich cultural tapestry of the Bay Area. She especially enjoyed Lake Merritt, and would take long walks around the park every weekend.

Ms. Clapsadle passed away on June 24th, 2003. She is survived by her beloved brother Robert, his wife Carol and their children Hanna and Jacob. The family still lives in Oakland, thriving on the roots that Nancy put down five decades ago and they cherish her memory and the city she loved.

We write to you requesting approval to collect funds at our 2<sup>nd</sup> Annual Gateway to Nature Springe Benefit event to be held at the Joaquin Miller Community Center on Saturday, April 25<sup>th</sup>, 2020. Please see below for our history, an overview of the event and additional information regarding how collected funds will be used.

#### **History of Organization**

Camps in Common is the proud non-profit operator of the City of Oakland's Feather River Camp, located in Quincy, CA. Feather River Camp was founded and established by the City of Oakland in 1924 and has over the course of its history, served tens of thousands of Oakland residents through summer youth and family camp programming.

Camps in Common was founded when in 2002, Harry Edwards, then Director of the Oakland Parks and Recreation Department proposed that Feather River Camp be closed. This was incredible shocking to the hundreds of families who camp served each summer and a group of longtime and dedicated campers came together to form a nonprofit, Camps in Common, to support efforts to save and advocate for the success of OFRC.

Our mission is to promote and celebrate connections between nature, family and community, creating unique opportunities to advance environmental awareness, cultural diversity, and youth empowerment.

During communications with the Parks & Recreation Department staff and City Council members, it became clear that the City of Oakland did not see continuing to operate the camp internally was a viable option and it was even suggested that CIC consider operating the camp.

In June of 2003, CIC was suddenly named the official operators of OFRC by the City. In the years that followed, with help from campers, volunteers and former and current city staff, the organization built systems and successfully transferred operations from the City to CIC.

Since 2003, CIC has benefited from strong and committed board members, partners within the City and dedicated staff and volunteers. Over \$700,000.00 of facility investments have been made through bond Measure WW, City of Oakland support and fundraising from Camps in Common.

Feather River Camp is one of the City of Oakland Parks, Recreation and Youth Development Department's longestrunning recreation programs. The 2019 season will mark the seventeenth year that Camps in Common (CIC) has operated the facility.



The Camps in Common Board of Directors oversees governance of the organization. The organization's day-to-day operations of Oakland Feather River Camp are managed by an Executive Director. Board members, year-round and seasonal staff, and an army of dedicated volunteers are committed to serving the mission of CIC and OFRC and work tirelessly to help realize our vision each year.

### Overview of Event & Request to Collect Funds On-Site

On April 25, 2020, Camps In Common and Oakland Feather River Camp plans to hold its second annual spring fundraising event. Our event is being held to generate funds for our scholarship program, which provides reduced rates or "camperships" to families or groups from low income and underserved neighborhoods. In 2019, CIC provided over \$71,000 in scholarships to 444 youth-and-individuals, including subsidized-rates to 380 Oakland Parks, Recreation and Youth Development youth to OFRC through Studio One's Art Meets Nature Camp.

Our goal is to raise \$100,000 at this event alone. We will sell tickets ahead of time for \$75 (early bird), \$85 after March 15th, and "Friend of Camps In Common" tickets for \$250. In addition, we are soliciting sponsors for the event from businesses and individuals to help underwrite the event.

On site, the event will consist of hearty appetizers and other small plate food. We will provide wine and beer, sparkling waters, and coffee. During the event we plan to have some calm musical entertainment while people are moving around bidding on our silent auction items. We will gather all necessary permits as required.

We are formally requesting to collect funds on site at the event through donations, a few last-minute door ticket/event registration sales and auction item payments. If approved, we anticipate bringing in about \$35,000-\$45,000 that night for the auction, donations, and the miscellaneous tickets. These funds need to be collected on site since people will be bidding on auction items which must be collected the day of the event.

The funds that will be collected will benefit Oakland youth and families through providing camperships to attend Oakland Feather River Camp. We are trying to increase the amount of Oakland youth and families who will have the opportunity to learn about and enjoy the outdoors, learn about the Plumas National Forrest, the Feather River, and participate in all the activities available at camp and increasing the amount of scholarship dollars to distribute to Oakland youth and families helps us towards that end.





The following report is prepared for the PRAC's consideration.

#### **SUMMARY**

On November 18, 2019, the Tree Services Division made a decision for tree removal permit ND19-172 (Attachment A) for 863 Vermont Ave. The Applicant (Christopher Kula) wanted to remove two black acacia trees and one beefwood tree on his property. After inspection, Tree Services approved the removal of the trees.

The Appellant (Thelma Fajardo) appealed the tree permit decision on November 26, 2019 (Attachment B). On the appeal claim form the appellant has stated that the removal of the trees will cause significant soil instability and will likely result in a possible landslide that will damage her property at 872 Walker Ave. The PRAC is the hearing body for non-development tree removal permit appeals, per Chapter 12.36.110 of the Oakland Municipal Code (OMC), the Protected Trees Ordinance (PTO).

#### BACKGROUND

On October 18, 2019 Tree Services received a non-development tree removal application ND19-172 for 863 Vermont Ave (Attachment C). The applicant and property owner is Christopher Kula. He requested the removal of the 2 black acacia trees and the one beefwood tree on the grounds of: (a) concerns the trees will break, (b) complaints from neighbors about tree debris falling in their yard, (c) improving the view and (d) providing space for a garden. On November 18, 2019 Tree Services approved tree permit ND19-172 on the basis that the trees have structural defects. Section 12.36050(A) of the Protected Trees Ordinance states a tree can be removed to insure the public health and safety as it relates to the health of the tree, potential hazard to life or property, proximity to existing or proposed structures, or interference with utilities or sewers.

Tree permit ND19-172 was appealed on November 26, 2019 by Thelma Fajardo, the property owner of 872 Walker Ave. The appellant claims that the removal of the trees will cause significant soil erosion and that will lead to a landslide. The Appellant attached a letter (Attachment D) to the claim form from Tracy Cael, a licensed professional, engineer giving an

opinion that the trees are healthy and alive, bearing green leaves and serving the vital purpose of abating soil erosion. According to the appeal, the removal of the trees could result in a landslide.

#### **DISCUSSION**

Tree Services approved the removals of tree removal permit application ND19-172 on November 18, 2019. City staff determined that the trees had significant structural defects. See detailed account listed below of staff findings:

Tree (#1) (Attachment E) is a 20" DBH black acacia tree that has a 44.5 degree lean, an unbalanced canopy that is in the direction of the lean and has signs of root plate movement in the past. Leans of more than 30 degrees are significant and the likelihood of whole tree failure is high. At the first stem junction, on the trunk, there is an 18" cracking seam of included bark with a narrow angle of attachment. This is a substantial structural defect that puts the tree at a high risk of trunk failure by splitting. The tree is recommended for removal under section 12.36.050(A)1 of the Protected Trees Ordinance.

Tree (#2) (Attachment F) is a 30" DBH black acacia tree that has codominant stems that develop at 6' measuring from the ground up on the trunk. At the attachment point of the 2 stems there is a 40" seam of included bark with a narrow angle of attachment. On the downhill side of the trunk the included bark seam is bulging. This is a sign that the include bark defect is in an advanced state. This is a substantial structural defect that puts the tree at a high risk of trunk failure by splitting. The tree has an unbalanced weighted canopy on the downhill side. The unbalanced canopy is from being shaded from the beefwood tree that is on the home side of the tree. The tree has ivy growing up the interior trunk and limbs. This adds weight to a tree with an unbalanced canopy. The tree is recommended for removal under section 12.36.050(A)1 of the Protected Trees Ordinance.

Tree (#3) (Attachment G) is a 5-stem 14", 18", 19", 10", 23" DBH beefwood tree. The tree separates into 5 stems at 3'on the trunk measuring from the ground up. At the attachment point of the 5 stems there is included bark with narrow angles of attachment. At 15' measuring from the ground up, the tree was topped in the past. From the old topping cuts the tree has grown poorly-attached 25'suckers. At the topping point the 18" DBH and 10" DBH stems have split out and died. There is a high likelihood of decay being present where the topping cut was made. The 5 interior stems are covered with ivy, adding to the weight of each stem. The upper canopy has many 1" to 3" diameter dead limbs. The tree is recommended for removal under section 12.36.050(A)1 of the Protected Trees Ordinance.

The Appellant, Thelma Fajardo, has stated that the removal of the trees will negatively impact the health and safety of her property and tenants located at 872 Walker Ave. Removal of the trees will pose possible hillside erosion / landslide onto her property.

The Protected Trees Ordinance 12.36.05(A)2 calls for adequate provision for drainage, erosion, land stability or windscreen. Tree Services believes that adequate provisions for drainage will be made by the property owner. In the past the backyard had been terraced. The property owner

indicated on the application that that a raised garden will be put in place in the middle of the yard and shrubs will be planted at the rear of the yard for screening. After the trees have been removed, there will be 5 small fruit trees, a clump of bamboo, 2 medium size shrubs and patches of ivy. The backyard will not be void of vegetation.

Chapter 12.36.110(C) of the OMC states, "In considering the appeal, the Park and Recreation Advisory Commission shall determine whether the proposed tree removal conforms to the applicable criteria. It may sustain the decision of the Public Works Agency or require such changes or impose such reasonable conditions of approval as are, in its judgment, necessary to ensure conformity to said criteria."

#### RECOMMENDATION

The Public Works Agency recommends that the Park and Recreation Advisory Commission:

Deny the appeal by Thelma Fajardo of 872 Walker Ave.

## SITE INSPECTION / FINDINGS

There is a 20" diameter at breast height (DBH) black acacia, 30" DBH black acacia and a 5 stem 14",18", 19", 10", 23" DBH beefwood growing in the backyard at 863 Vermont St.

Tree (#1) is a 20" DBH black acacia that has a 45 degree lean with signs of root plate movement in the past. The tree is approved for removal.

Tree (#2) is a 30" DBH black acacia that has codominant stems with included bark and a narrow angle of attachment. The tree is covered with ivy. The tree is approved for removal.

Tree (#3) is a 5-stem 14", 18", 19", 10", 23" DBH beefwood. The tree has poor structure having been topped in the past. At the topping point the 18" and 10" DBH stems have split out and died. Where the 5 stems are attached there is included bark. The tree is covered with ivy and has many 1" to 3" diameter dead limbs. The tree is approved for removal.

# OAKLAND MUNICIPAL CODE SECTION 12.36.060 CONDITIONS OF APPROVAL

The following conditions were imposed. Conditions #11 - #13 were imposed if they were check marked:

- 1. Defense, Indemnification and Hold Harmless. To the maximum extent permitted by law, the applicant and its contractor shall defend (with counsel acceptable to the City), indemnify, and hold harmless the City of Oakland, the Oakland City Council, the Oakland Public Works Agency and its respective agents, officers, employees and volunteers (hereafter collectively called City) from any liability, damages, claim, judgment, loss (direct or indirect), action, causes of action or proceeding (including legal costs, attorneys' fees, expert witness or consultant fees, City Attorney or staff time, expenses or costs) (collectively called "Action") against the City for or on account of any damage to property or bodily injury, including death, or damage sustained or arising out of, related to or caused by in any way from the performance of work in this tree permit matter. The City may elect, in its sole discretion, to participate in the defense of said Action and the applicant shall reimburse the City for its reasonable legal costs and attorneys' fees.
- 2. Defense, Indemnification and Hold Harmless. To the maximum extent permitted by law, the applicant shall defend (with counsel acceptable to the City), indemnify, and hold harmless the City of Oakland, the Oakland City Council, the Oakland Public Works Agency and its respective agents, officers, employees and volunteers (hereafter collectively called City) from any liability, damages, claim, judgment, loss (direct or indirect), action, causes of action or proceeding (including legal costs, attorneys' fees, expert witness or consultant fees, City Attorney or staff time, expenses or costs) (collectively called "Action") against the City to attack, set aside, void or annul, (a) an approval by the City relating to this tree permit matter, City's CEQA approvals and determination, and/or notices in the tree permit matter; or (b) implementation of such. The City may elect, in its sole discretion, to participate in the defense of said Action and the applicant shall reimburse the City for its reasonable legal costs and attorneys' fees.
- 3. Letter of Agreement. Within ten (10) calendar days of the filing of any Action as specified in conditions 1 or 2 above, the applicant and/or its contractor shall execute a Letter of Agreement with the City, acceptable to the Office of the City Attorney, which memorializes the above obligations. These obligations and the Letter of Agreement shall survive termination, extinguishment or invalidation of the approval. Failure to timely execute the Letter of Agreement does not relieve the applicant of any of the obligations contained in this Section or any other requirements or conditions of approval that may be imposed by the City.
- 4. **Debris.** All debris created as a result of any tree removal work shall be removed from the property by the applicant within two weeks of debris creation, and such debris shall be properly disposed of by the applicant in accordance with all applicable laws, ordinances, and regulations.

- 5. Hazards. The removal of extremely hazardous, diseased, and/or dead trees shall be required where such trees have been identified by the City Arborist.
- 6. Insurance. Workers compensation, public liability, and property damage insurance shall be provided by any person(s) performing tree removal work authorized by a tree removal permit.
- 7. Nesting Birds. To the extent feasible, removal of any tree and/or other vegetation suitable for nesting of raptors shall not occur during the breeding season of March 15 and August 15. If tree removal must occur during the breeding season, all sites shall be surveyed by a qualified biologist to verify the presence or absence of nesting raptors or other birds. Pre-removal surveys shall be conducted within 15 days prior to start of work from March 15 through May 31, and within 30 days prior to the start of work from June 1 through August 15. The pre-removal surveys shall be submitted to the Planning and Zoning Division and the Tree Services Division of the Public Works Agency. If the survey indicates the potential presences of nesting raptors or other birds, the biologist shall determine an appropriately sized buffer around the nest in which no work will be allowed until the young have successfully fledged. The size of the nest buffer will be determined by the biologist in consultation with the CDFG, and will be based to a large extent on the nesting species and its sensitivity to disturbance. In general, buffer sizes of 200 feet for raptors and 50 feet for other birds should suffice to prevent disturbance to birds nesting in the urban environment, but these buffers may be increased or decreased, as appropriate, depending on the bird species and the level of disturbance anticipated near the nest.
- 8. Permit. Tree removal, as defined in the Protected Trees Ordinance, Section 12.36.020 of the Oakland Municipal Code, may not start unless and until the applicant has received this permit from Tree Services.
- **9. Posting.** The applicant shall post a copy of the tree removal permit in plain view on site while tree removal work is underway.
- 10. Tree Damage. If any damage to a protected tree should occur during or as a result of work on the site, the applicant shall immediately notify the Tree Services Division of such damage. If, in the professional opinion of the City Arborist, such tree cannot be preserved in a healthy state, the Arborist shall require replacement of any tree removed with another tree or trees on the same site deemed adequate by the Arborist to compensate for the loss of the tree that is removed.
- □ 11. In Lieu Fee. If replacement trees are required, but cannot be planted due to site constraints, an in lieu fee as determined by the City's master fee schedule may be substituted for required replacement plantings. The permit is valid and issued only after payment is received by Tree Services.
- □ 12. Replacement Trees. The property owner shall plant \_\_\_\_ replacement trees on the property. The replacement trees shall be excellent quality nursery stock and maintained by the applicant until established. Any replacement planting which fails to become established within one year of installation shall be replanted at the applicant's expense. Plantings shall be installed within 30 days of tree removal. A photograph of the replacement trees, installed in the landscape of the property, shall be mailed or emailed to Tree Services within one week of the replacement trees being installed.
  - □ a. The minimum size replacement tree shall be a twenty-four (24) inch box, except that three, fifteen (15) gallon size trees may be substituted for each twenty-four (24) inch box size tree where appropriate, if approved by the City Arborist.








My name is Triscila Cael, and I am a licensed professional engineer in the State of California. I visually inspected the property at 863 Vermont St. on November 24, 2019 with regards to the tree removal issue. In my professional opinion, removal of the trees in question would very likely cause soil instability of the incline above the property located at 872 Walker Avenue, Oakland, CA. Upon inspection, the trees are healthy and alive bearing green leaves, and serve the vital purpose of abating soil erosion. See attached photos. The proposed removal of these trees would cause significant soil instability and very likely result in possible landslide during heavy rains. The high risk of landslide would likely cause severe damage to the buildings and landscaping at the properties at 876 Walker Ave. and 872 Walker Ave. More importantly, this would cause safety risk to the occupants who reside to these properties. Therefore, I must recommend that none of the trees be removed at the property at 863 Vermont St.
