

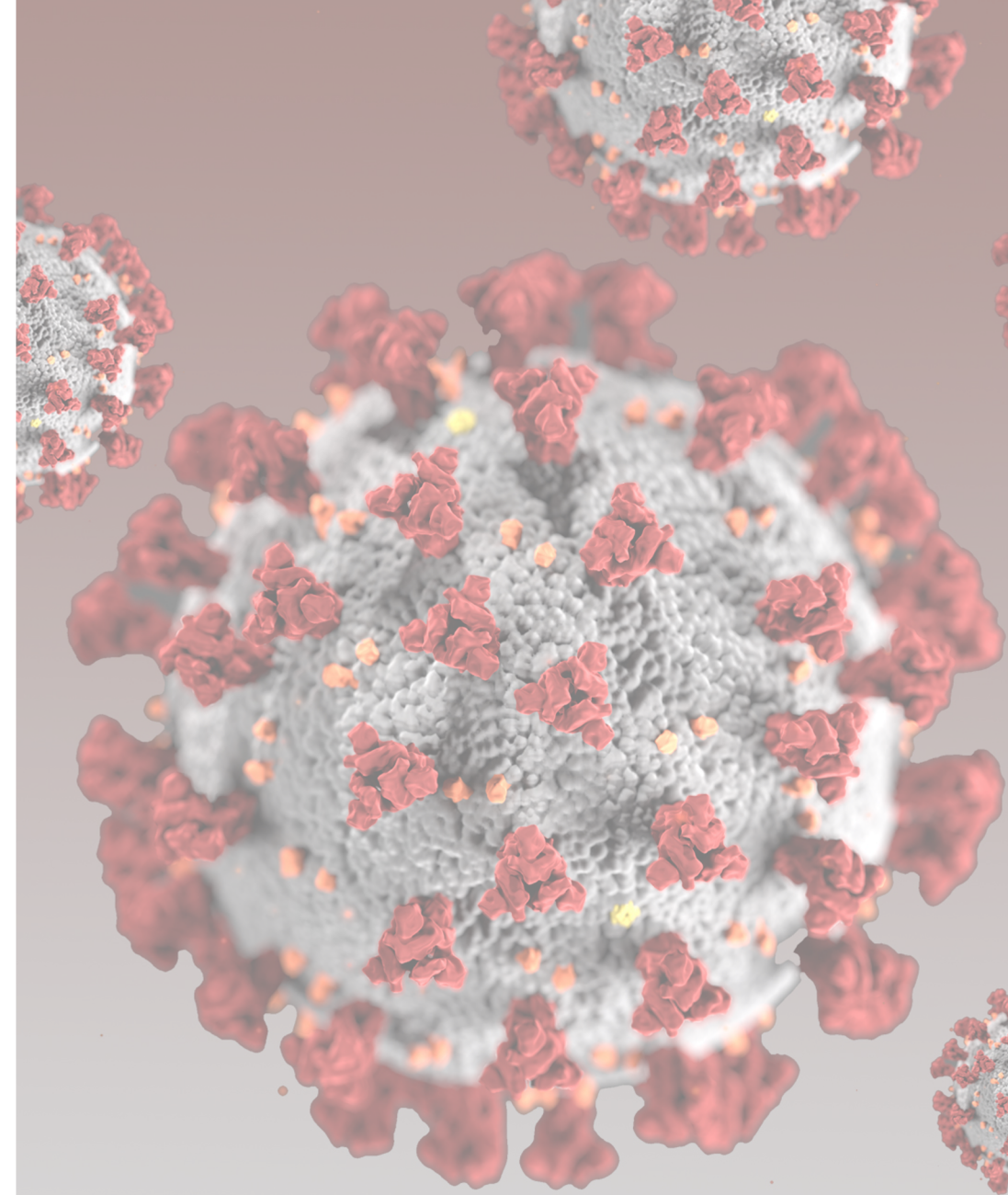

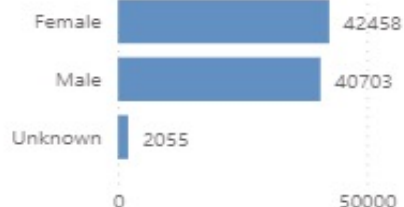

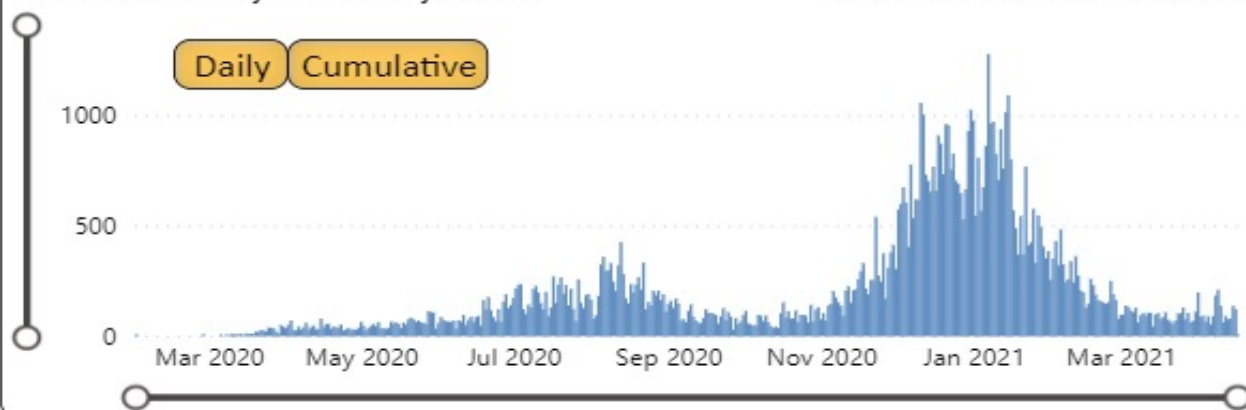

Gender

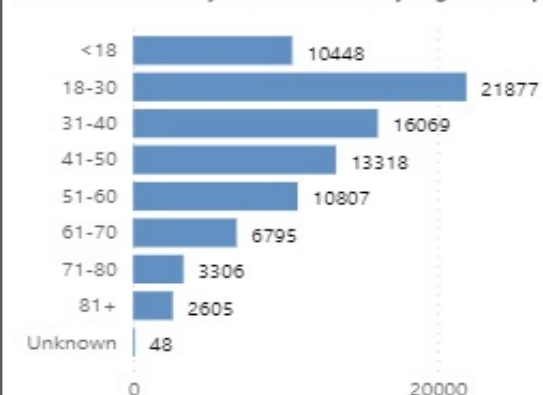

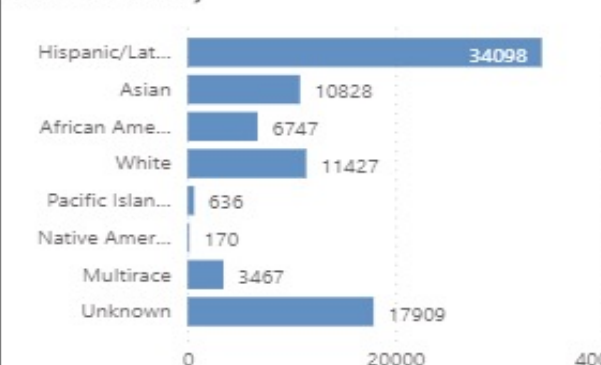

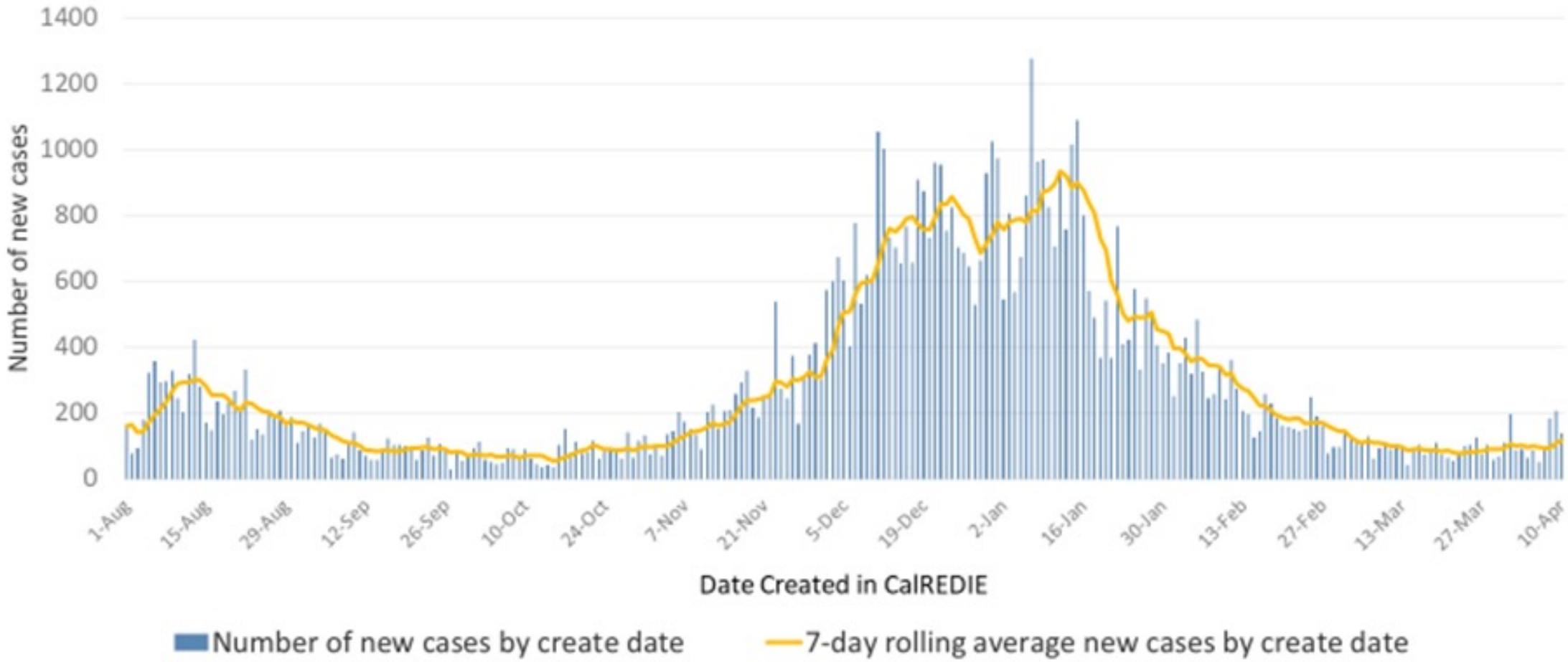

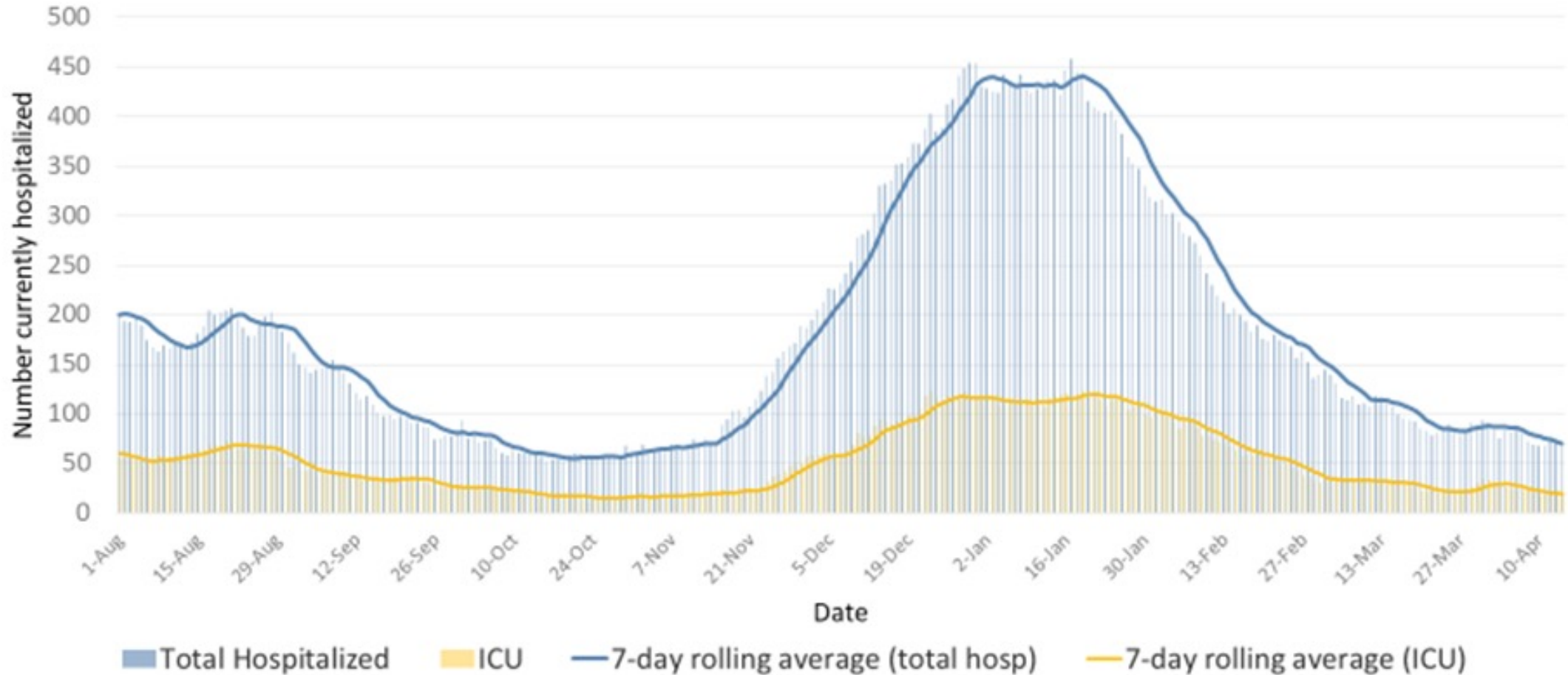
New Alameda County COVID-19 Cases by date created

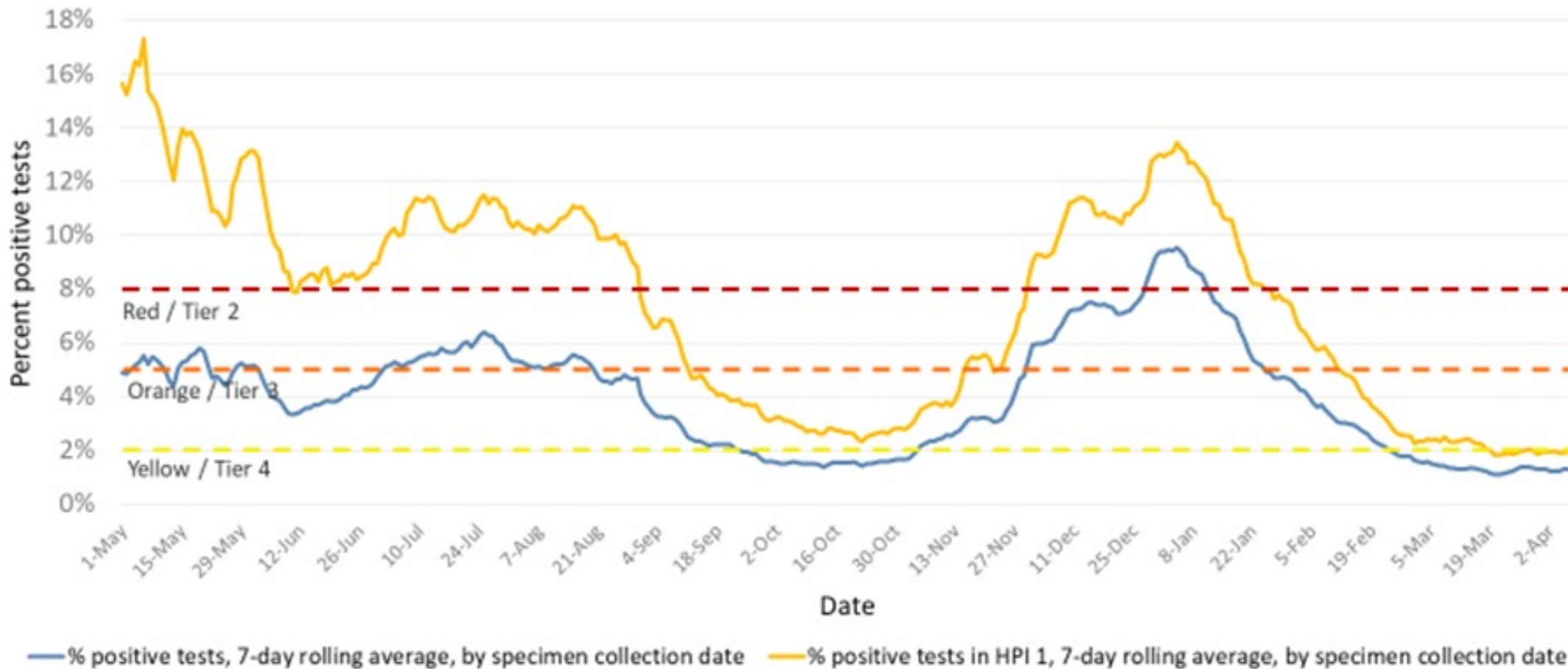
COVID-19 Patients Currently Hospitalized in Alameda County

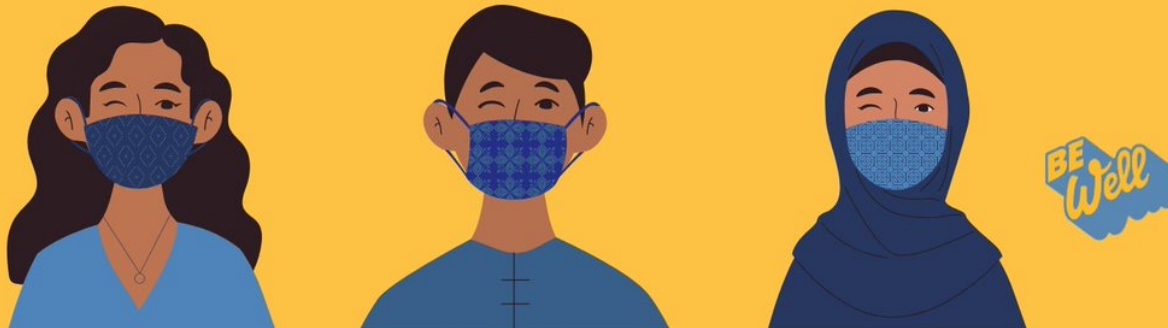

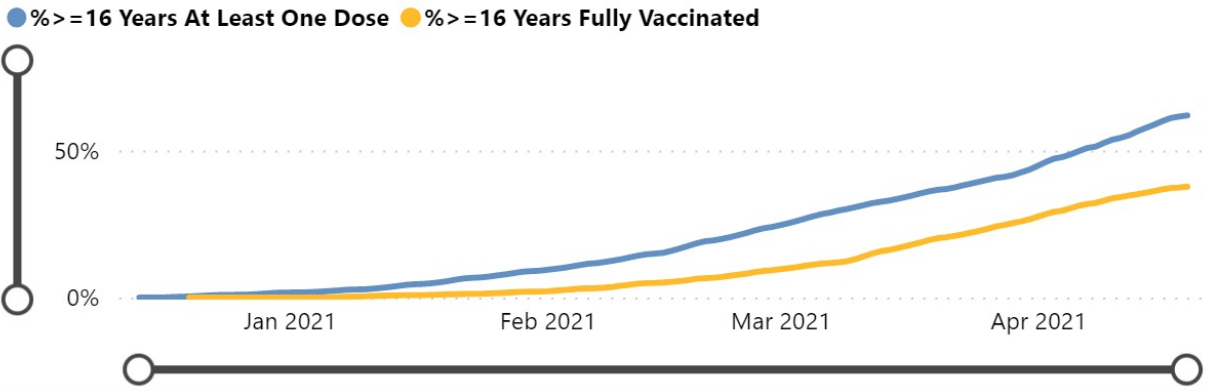

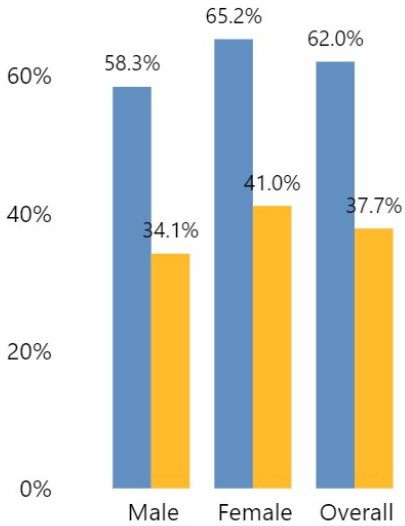

Alameda County Cumulative Percentage of Vaccine Doses



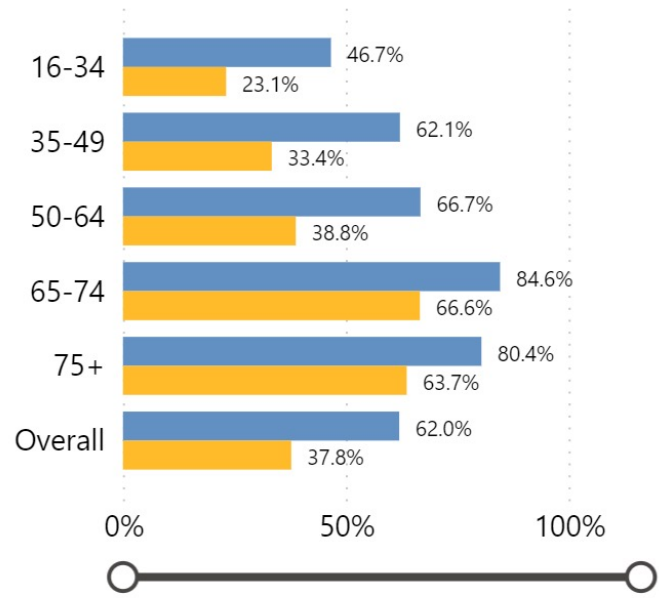
Doses by Gender (% of population >=16 years)

At Least One Dose Fully Vaccinated



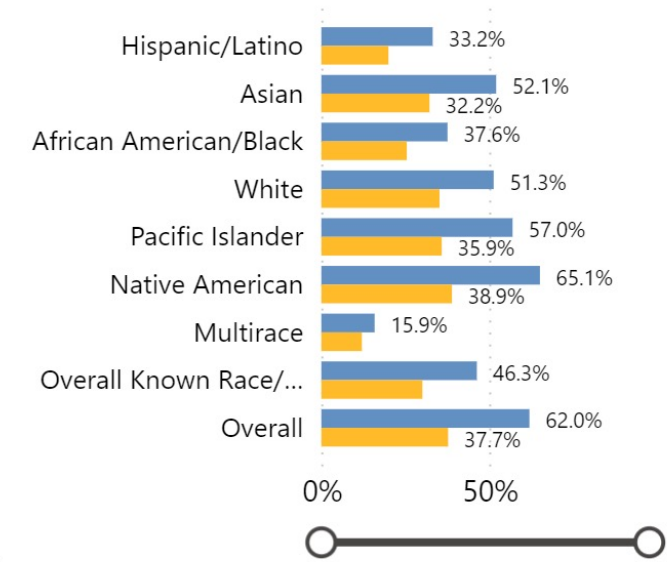
Doses by Age Group (% of population)

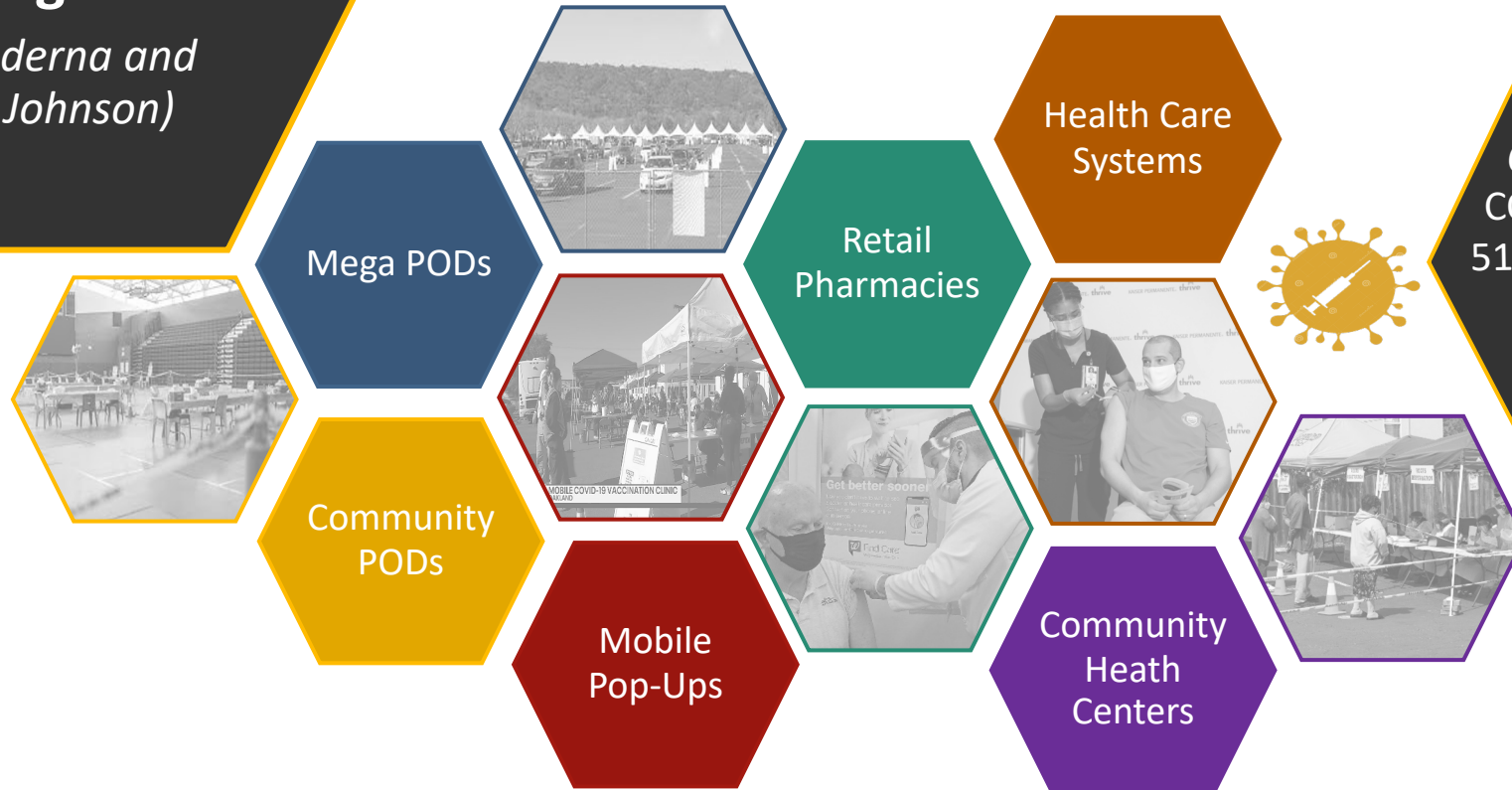

General information about COVID-19 vaccine planning and administration

CDC has recommended a pause in the use of the Johnson & Johnson (Janssen) vaccine in the United States out of an abundance of caution, effective Tuesday, April 13. Of the 6.8 million Johnson & Johnson vaccine doses administered in the United States to date, six cases of a type of blood clot called cerebral venous sinus thrombosis (CVST) were seen in combination with low levels of blood platelets (thrombocytopenia). The CDC advised the [Advisory Committee on Immunization Practices](#) (ACIP) on Wednesday, April 14, to further assess their potential significance. FDA will review that analysis as it also investigates these reports.

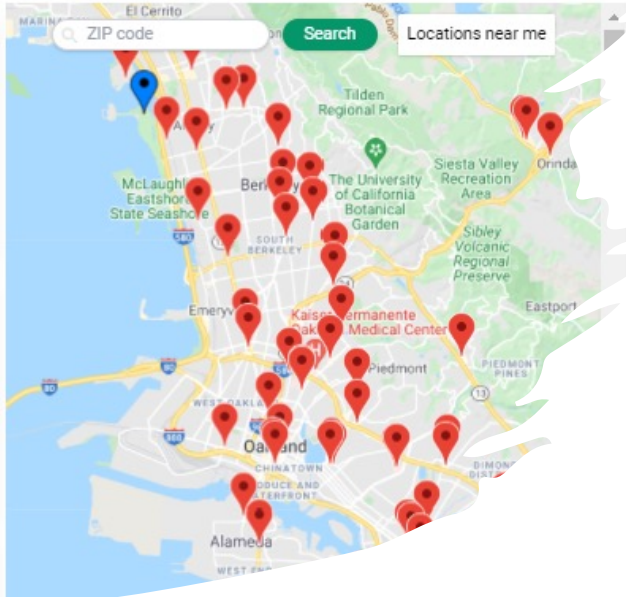

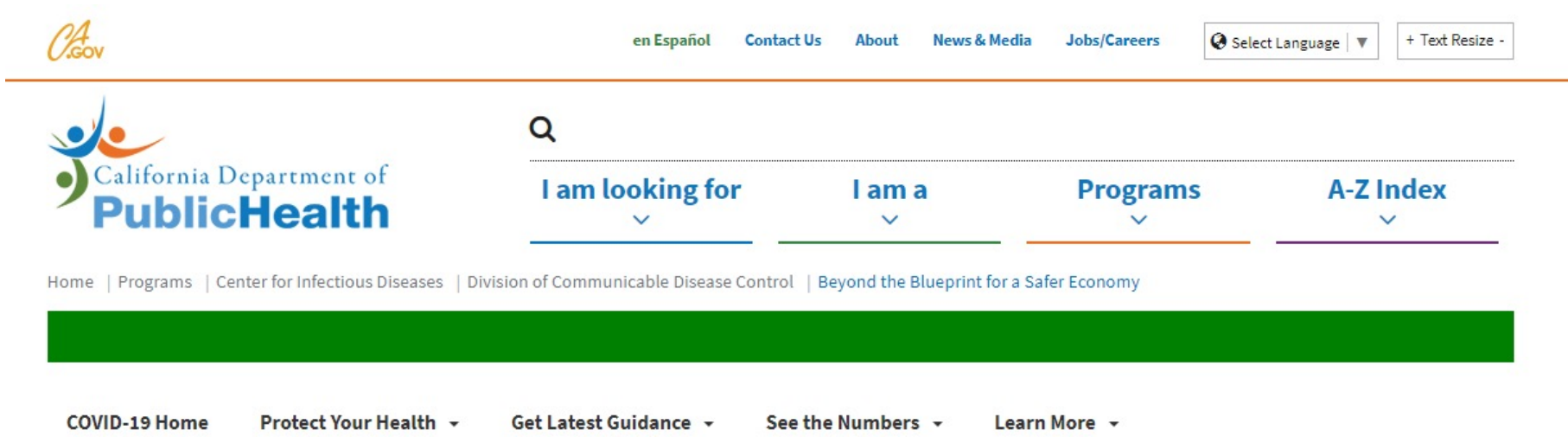

Beyond the Blueprint for a Safer Economy

As we reach 20 million vaccines administered and COVID-19 case rates and hospitalizations have stabilized, California is looking to move beyond the Blueprint for a Safer Economy to fully reopening our economy. On June 15, all industries across the state can return to usual operations with common-sense risk reduction measures such as masking and vaccinations.

What triggers our move Beyond the Blueprint?

On June 15, California will fully open its economy if the following **two** criteria are met:

- 1) Equitable vaccine availability: If vaccine supply is sufficient for all Californians aged 16 years or older, who wish to be inoculated.
- 2) Consistently low burden of disease: If hospitalizations are stable and low, and specifically if hospitalizations among fully vaccinated individuals are low.



What happens beyond the Blueprint?

- All sectors listed in the current [Blueprint Activities and Business Tiers Chart](#) may return to usual operations, in compliance with statewide agency guidelines and standards such as masking, testing, and testing or vaccination verification requirements for large-scale higher-risk events.
- Schools and institutions of higher education conduct full-time, in person instruction, in compliance with Cal/OSHA emergency temporary standards and public health guidelines.
- Workplaces promote policies that reduce risk, including improved indoor ventilation, and mask-wearing in indoor and other high-risk settings, as well as remote work without impacting business operations, when possible.
- Californians and travelers will be subject to any current CDPH and CDC travel restrictions.

Updates to the Blueprint for a Safer Economy

Effective April 15, 2021, the [California State Blueprint for a Safer Economy](#) reopening framework will allow additional activities to resume with modifications to reduce risk. This update will include guidance for gatherings, private events or meetings such as receptions or conferences, and indoor live events and performances. For more information, see the most recent [California State COVID-19 Press Release](#).

As vaccines continued to be administered statewide and COVID-19 case rates and hospitalizations have remain stable, the California Department of Public Health announced last week that they will be looking to move California beyond the Blueprint for a Safer Economy to fully reopening our economy on June 15 when two criteria are met: 1) equitable vaccine availability for Californians ages 16 years and older and 2) consistently low burden on disease where hospitalizations are stable and low. The goal of the School and Shared Portal for Outbreak Tracking (SPOT) is to expand California's contact tracing efforts by facilitating collaboration and sharing of information between schools, workplaces, and local health departments (LHDs), through CalCONNECT, California's public health contact tracing and data management system.

This SPOT portal is available, within certain LHDs, for schools and businesses to report COVID-19 exposures at their locations and worksites to their local health departments.

Once the information you enter is reviewed by the health department, you may be provided additional login credentials to enter specific data about persons involved in the exposure.
